**MINUTES**

1. **Call to Order:** President Lisa Karim called the meeting to order at 10:01am.

2. **Approval of Minutes**

a. **August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019 meeting minutes**

A ***motion*** to approve the minutes of August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019 was made by Mary Etter and ***seconded*** by Sam Lee and was ***approved by a majority. Motion passed.*** Abstentions: None.

3. **Old Business**

- a. **President's Report-Lisa Karim:** Lisa opened her report by stating that if anyone receives an email from her that looks suspicious they should delete it. As in the past few year, the CLA President's email seems to be a target for hackers.

She noted that the CLA website will be redesigned with the assistance and guidance of the Publicity Committee and Jen Datum.

She congratulated the Career Development Committee on a very successful Leadership Institute and thanked them for working with a sponsor to offset the cost. She also recognized and thanked the other Sections and Committees planning workshops who have sought sponsor support. Given the current financial state of CLA finding ways of costs savings is imperative. She mentioned that in order to save money she has been working with Tracy at CLC over the past month and the Executive Committee voted to approve changing CLA's credit card processing vendor from Global Payment to Host Merchant. This changeover will happen in the next few weeks. Host Merchant anticipates savings of thousands of dollars annually.

Lisa congratulated Danielle Valenzano on her participation in NELLs and thanked Tom for representing CLA at NELLs while she was on vacation. Mary Etter later reported that many of the NELLs participants from this year were CLA Board members including Colleen Bailie and Matt Earls. Also in attendance was past Board member Kari Hamad. Lisa congratulated all of them on their participation.

She mentioned she was delighted to report that the Legacy Fund had \$500 in contributions in the past month. This becomes \$1,000 with the matching funds pledged by former CLA President Maxine Bleiweis. Lisa thanked those who had already contributed and encouraged those around the table to contribute before December 31 in order to take advantage of Maxine's offer to match donations.

Finally, she mentioned the webinar which Maria Bernier had posted to Conntech, scheduled for that afternoon, "Navigating the Census Site" and encouraged Board members to participate to keep abreast of the census information.

- b. **Treasurer's Report-Kristina Edwards:** Kristina reported that the following documents are available on the CLA website: templates for program budgets and speaker confirmation form, updated expense form with instructions for clarification on filling out the form, and the updated CLA Financial Plan. Kristina also echoed Lisa Karim's thank you and congratulations to the Leadership Institute for a successful program,

as well as making additional funds for CLA through sponsorships. Kristina stated that she will look to return to the Financial Plan at the next meeting and start touching base with each of the sections and committees to make sure they have what they need for their programs and answer any questions about reimbursement or expenses they might have throughout the process.

#### 4. New Business:

- a. **State Librarian Search Committee Update:** Mary reported that there are 14 applications and the committee is meeting tomorrow to start reviewing. They will provide the search committee with the list of recommendations.
- b. **Annual Conference Registration Rates [VOTE REQUIRED]**  
A \$25 increase to Early Bird Member 2-day rate and \$20 increase to the Member and Non-Member 1-day rate was explained by Stephanie Prato.  
A *motion* to approve the Annual Conference Registration rate change was made by Peter Ciparelli and *seconded* by Kate Byroade and was **approved by a majority. Motion passed.** Abstentions: None.
- c. **LGBTQ+ Section Bylaws [VOTE REQUIRED]**  
Article 4 and Article 9 both need "Technology" changed to "LGBTQ+"  
A *motion* to approve the LGBTQ+ Section Bylaws (with stated changed) was made by Tom Piezzo and *seconded* by Peter Ciparelli and was **approved by a majority. Motion passed.** Abstentions: None.

#### Committee/Section/Roundtable/Regional Representatives Reports:

**ACLB: Denise Stankovics:** Denise reported that ACLB's Fall meeting will be Friday, November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Ken Wiggin will be giving the keynote address on measures that matter and there will be 4 separate breakout sessions which are: Board Basics (refresher on good board governance and practice), a CT Data Collaborative Panel (effective use of data to assess community needs, advocate and build support for libraries), Media: Navigating a Hyper Democratized Media Landscape (strategies to foster positive media relationships) and an untitled session with Catherine Marx, Partnership Specialist with the U.S. Census Bureau, on libraries' role in seeing to it that everyone is counted in the 2020 census. The after-lunch speaker will be Hugo Balto of CT Latino News on the "CT Public Library Stories" partnership.

**ACLPD: Ramona Burkey:** Ramona reported that resource sharing information going to the State Library and you'll hear more about that going forward. In the 5 year LSTA Plan there is a plan to start an Urban Libraries task force in CT. They talked a lot about social workers in libraries and partnering in libraries and ways to support urban libraries in CT. Looking at possibly a symposium and grant opportunities for programs, services, and all sorts of activities to benefit urban libraries.

**Archivist: Gerald Seagrave:** Gerry said that 6 Board members met to review boxes of CLA Archives using the new Archives Retention Policy and 4 boxes are scheduled to go to the Archives at the CT State Library. Gerry thanked everyone who helped.

**BCALA: Vivian Bordeaux & Robert Kinney:** Vivian reported that a task force is being established by ALA to look into ending fines in libraries. She asked people to continue being a member of ALA and to let their voice be heard. For BCALA news, she reported that they will be celebrating 50 years in existence in 2020 as well as 50 years for the Coretta Scott King Association group. She mentioned to look for that information that will be coming out nationwide.

**Career Development: Laura Horn:** Leadership Institute was in the beginning of August. Made more money than last year despite fewer attendees due to more sponsorships. Sent out a survey to all attendees, received great feedback. Looking at dates for next year – thinking of pushing it back a week due to academic librarians’ schedule. Next meeting, late October/early November to talk about the scholarship process.

**CLC: Jennifer Keohane:** Absent

**Commission on Ed Tech: Colleen Bailie:** Colleen stated that the next meeting is Monday 9/9, and she will have more to report next month.

**CSL: Ken Wiggin:** Ken reported that:

- 1) The Connecticut State Historical Records Advisory Board (CT SHRAB), in collaboration with Conservation ConneCTion, awarded \$17,288 to eight public libraries and museums in the state. The funding is from the National Historic Publications & Records Commission (NHPRC), The grant funds will be used to bring professional archivists on-site to instruct staff and volunteers in archival standards and best practices to aid them in making their historical records more accessible to researchers. The 4 libraries are: Avon Free Public Library; Bill Memorial Library, Groton, CT; Canton Public Library; and the C. H. Booth Library, Newtown, CT.
- 3) Connecticut State Library received a \$263,291 grant from the NEH through the National Digital Newspaper Program, to support the CT Digital Newspaper Project. The State Library will be recruiting for new Project Coordinator.
- 4) Contacted Senator Murphy's office. He is on the Senate Appropriations Labor-HHS-Education Subcommittee which is scheduled to markup the 2020 budget Tuesday, September 10. I encouraged the Senator to support an increase in funding for the Institute of Museum and Library Services and specifically the Library Services and Technology Act funding for grants to states. The reauthorization of LSTA earlier this year increases the base for each state. The increase will be incremental based on any increases in funding for LSTA. In August a member of Sen. Murphy's staff, meet with Dawn, Gail Hurley and Christine Pittsley at the Service Center to learn about all of the projects and services that are federally funded.
- 5) We will be distributing over 15,000 copies of Gerald McBoing Boing to libraries statewide. Kym Powe will be handling the distribution. The funds to print a special edition for CT came from a donor directed fund at Hartford Foundation for Public Giving. The donor is anonymous and the books was his choice.
- 6) The legislature has still not passed a bond package for the biennium. However we are carrying forward funding which hopefully will be sufficient for the current round of grants. There are currently 8 library projects waiting for Bond Commission approval.

Memory Cafés are social events for individuals experiencing cognitive changes from Alzheimer’s or other forms of dementia, as well as their family members. Each Memory Café is unique and offers an easy and fun way to socialize with others who have this shared experience while sharing light refreshments, an activity, and relaxing conversation. The Memory Café is not intended for unaccompanied persons with significant care needs.

- Westport: The 2nd Annual Saugatuck StoryFest is happening 9/26-28. They just announced that R.L. Stine is the keynote on Saturday.
- Easton: They are embarking on updating their strategic plan, which expired several years ago. They are also in the process of collaborating with the Municipal Agent for the Aging to offer a Homebound Delivery Service.
- Newtown: They are looking to fill the vacancy for a Young Adult Librarian and Volunteer Coordinator. Their search starts this month. They also received a grant from the state's Historical Records Advisory Board in collaboration with Conservation ConneCTion for training that will assist in caring for some of their library's cultural treasures.

- Cheshire Public Library hired a new Children’s Librarian, Andrea Willard, in July. The Town Council approved moving vacant Adult Services Librarian hours to make 2 part-time Adult Services positions full-time. They will debut their new Virtual Reality Oculus Quest headset at the Cheshire Fall Festival on September 14<sup>th</sup> which is focusing on the 325<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Cheshire. They are creating 360 degree virtual tours of historical spots, using the headset.
- Blackstone Library wrapped up summer reading, and hosted their 1<sup>st</sup> community movie in partnership with Parks & Rec. 250 people signed up! They are about to complete the new entry, as part of the library-wide renovation project. The entry adds 2000 square feet and includes a roof-top terrace. A small reception is being planned to celebrate the completion of this phase. Sarah Mallory [previously from Hagaman] has joined Blackstone as Teen librarian.
- Plumb Memorial in the Shelton Library System will be undergoing renovations.
- Acton Library hired a new YA Librarian and a part-time Reference Librarian. They will begin offering Notary Public services in October and are starting their Strategic Planning this fall. They will also be hosting the Region 5 Legislative Town Hall on October 28<sup>th</sup> at 5pm

- Public Library of New London has partnered with local businesses who will offer a discount with your library card.
